As early as thousands of years ago, an Egyptian physician recorded his observations of a patient with a spinal cord injury, describing a dislocated vertebra in the neck, paralysis, Overview of Rehabilitation In 1923, the American College of Radiology and Physiotherapy (ACRPT) was founded. However, the field of radiology progressed so rapidly that the American College of Radiology was created from the ACRPT and the ACRPT was reorganized into the American Congress of Physical Therapy in 1925. 6 Philosophy and History of Rehabilitation Physical medicine and rehabilitation (PM&R), or physiatry, is a medical specialty focused on prevention, diagnosis, rehabilitation, and therapy for patients who experience functional limitations resulting from injury, disease, or malformation. Although the specialty is a relatively young one (with beginnings in the early twentieth century), fundamentals of the field originated during ancient times. The Philosophy and History of Prisons The rehabilitation model of corrections began in the 1930s and reached

its high point in the 1950s. Qualified staff members were expected to diagnose the cause of an offender's criminal behavior, prescribe a treatment to change the individual, and determine when that individual had become rehabilitated. Rehabilitation counseling emerged as a distinct profession in 1920 with the passage of the Smith- Fess Act, which established the federal-state vocational rehabilitation (VR) program.³The training provision of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act Amendments of 1954 (PL 565) further spurred the profession by allocating funding for the development of widespread master's level rehabilitation counseling training programs. FOUNDATIONS OF REHABILITATION COUNSELING Rehabilitation is a specialty practice that was organized as a nursing specialty in 1964. Rehabilitation nursing has been defined as “the diagnosis and treatment of human responses of individuals and groups to actual or potential health problems stemming from altered functional ability and altered lifestyle” [2]. Mapping the literature of rehabilitation nursing HISTORY Ideas of rehabilitation through punishment were first embodied in the penitentiaries, built during the Jacksonian era of the late 19th century. Reformers hoped that felons would be “kept in solitude, reflecting penitently on their sins in order that they might cleanse and transform themselves” (Irwin, 1980, p. 2). Rehabilitation Theory 831 Until the mid-1970s, rehabilitation was a key part of U.S. prison policy. Prisoners were encouraged to develop occupational skills and to resolve psychological problems--such as substance abuse or

aggression--that might interfere with their reintegration into society. Rehabilitate or punish? Rehabilitation is the process of re-educating and retraining those who commit crime. It generally involves psychological approaches which target the cognitive distortions associated with specific kinds of crime committed by particular offenders - but may also involve more general education such as literacy skills and work training.
